Overwhelming support has poured in for Luke "Sasha" Fleischman, an agender high school student who was set on fire on an Oakland, CA public bus this month. Police arrested a 16-year-old Oakland student for the immolation, and announced that he will be charged as an adult for a hate crime.

Sasha was wearing a skirt at the time of the attack, which friends and family fear may have been the reason Sasha was targeted.
