The film will broadcast on PBS nationally on Sept. 21 at 10 p.m.-though do check your local listings for times.

Our executive producer Patrice O'Neill has been globe-trotting, speaking about NIOT and *Light In the Darkness* with national leaders in Washington, DC, funders and fellow filmmakers-for-change in New York at Good Pitch, and interfaith leaders in Dresden, Germany at the 33rd Kirchentag. We are working with public media stations across the country, interest in [Not in Our School](#) continues to grow, and our films on [positive community responses to the Westboro Baptist Church](#) continue to serve a need. Joplin, MO: After the Tornado, the WBC?

After the deadliest tornado on record flattened Joplin, MO, another threat appeared on the horizon: The Westboro Baptist Church.

The hate group threatened to protest on Memorial Day weekend, during President Obama's visit. News traveled quickly, sparking people to action. Amid the rubble, people stood up in support of this town of 50,000, including the 125 dead and the more than 900 injured.

Within hours, Facebook communities popped up, planning how to

respond peacefully to the Westboro Baptist Church. When [we first posted about it](#), 18 groups had formed, comprised of between five to [more than 10,000 people](#) each. The support was not limited to those with a personal connection to Joplin: People sent messages from Kansas City, MO, planned a [motorcycle calvacade from Coffeyville, KS](#), and [caravans from Northwest Arkansas](#). Others [pledged \\$1 for every Westboro picketer to the Ozark Red Cross](#).

There's mixed reports on whether the WBC showed. Some say they did, others that they were at a diner before the memorial and were "blocked in by semi-trucks and motorcyclists and could not get out." Either way, thousands rallied in support of Joplin residents.
