Marshalltown launches anti-bullying effort

'Not In Our Town' initiative taking shape

A youth survey conducted last year showed that 41 percent of Marshalltown students surveyed had been bullied in the last 30 days. Eleven percent of those students said they didn't go to school because they felt unsafe at school or on their way to and from school.

Marshalltown community leaders say they're taking a stand against bullying — before tragedy strikes.

"We want to send a message

ment." Tullis said the group will not only focus on bullying among students, but also cyber-bullying and workplace bullying.

"It will be far-reaching," he said.

The "Not In Our Town" effort will make its debut this week in two places — the Times-Republican and The Orpheum Theater Center.

Marshalltown, Iowa's newspaper, the *Times-Republican*, launched their town's Not In Our Town initiative on June 3, bringing together more than 25 community leaders. The initiative features national speakers, film screenings and local events.

"We want to see if we can be ahead of the curve as a community in preventing bullying," *Times-Republican* publisher Mike Schlesinger said. "We want to look at ways to prevent school bullying, but also workplace bullying, domestic violence and other types of bullying among adults."
