FBI to track hate crimes against Sikhs, Hindus and other groups

After prolonged campaigning by advocates for the Sikh-American community, the FBI announced this week that they would start monitoring hate crimes against Sikhs, Hindus, and other religious groups, as well as Arab-American and Middle-Eastern communities, according to The Washington Post.

Harpreet Saini, whose mother was murdered at the mass shooting in Oak Creek, WI last year, said, "This is a step in the right direction to ensure that no one else will have to suffer what my brother and I suffered after losing our mother to a hate crime last August."
